A team of 28 young translators and English as an additional language (EAL) buddies who speak a total of nine different foreign languages have been assisting other Stanground Academy students, parents and staff. These inspirational young leaders, who wear purple 'Young Translator' and yellow 'EAL Buddy' badges on their uniforms, are on hand to act as buddies for students who have just started at school and do not speak English as their first language.

They assist with support, interpreting and translation around the school. The young translators and EAL buddies have also been working on a range of projects including the European Week of Languages and Christmas Around the World Project. The scheme equips them with new skills they may use in their future professional career. This new opportunity complements the range of leadership activities offered at the Stanground Academy.
